

This is to notify you that in lieu of a regular service, there will be a **Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday 15 December 2013 at 10:30 AM** in the Parish Hall of the church, 35 Cleveland Street, Orange, NJ. The agenda will include:

- **Update on progress on the discussions with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Montclair** regarding possible merger of the two congregations, the primary goal of which is the continuation of the UU urban ministry in Orange.
- **Approve the hiring of the Rev. Gordon Bailey as part-time Consulting Minister.** [NOTE: Rev. Bailey will be preaching in Orange on 8 December. Biographical and other Information about Rev. Bailey will be forthcoming.]

He is married to Lisa Stiffler Bailey and they have four children (Jennifer, Devin, Ethan, Darien) between them and one grand daughter (Kai). He graduated from the University of Chicago with a degree in counseling, and earned a postgraduate degree in counseling from the Institute of Religion and Health in NYC. Formerly a therapist of the DiMele Center for Counseling & Psychotherapy in Manhattan, Allen's life long interest has been in unifying the internal, personal, psychological world, commonly called "spiritual", and the external political, social, economic, environmental world, -- the material world. He defines himself as an earth-centered, Buddhist, UU.

Pamela Thomas – An Unsung Heroine**Georgiana Hart**

I've gotten to be close friends with Pamela Thomas, a woman who goes to my gym. She speaks regularly to most patrons who attend the gym, knowing about ninety percent of their names. I noticed that often people would tell her they had used clothing, and frequently one or another person would carry a huge bag of clothing into the gym to put in her car, but I didn't question why.

Pamela is a dedicated member of the Church of God and Saints of God church on Central Avenue In Newark. She is not a member in name only. On Tuesdays, I discovered, all day, she collects, sorts and distributes clothing to needy folks in the neighborhood. Most who arrive at the doorstep will never become members of her church. She admits that few of the regular members of her own congregation are so active. That doesn't stop her from consistently asking people at our gym if they have something they haven't worn lately for the folks who do without.

One day I mentioned to her that our church donates a dozen boxes of food to needy families at the elementary school next door and how we paid a local supermarket to make up the boxes. Last Thanksgiving, Pamela suggested to me how she can "do better" at that price and even serve "serve several more fami-



lies" for the holiday. She came through as promised on the delivery date, just days before the children's days off.

Pamela only admitted to me a month afterwards that several days before the expected date, the place where she had been ready to get a good deal on turkeys fell through. She had to desperately search suppliers and scramble for miles before she reached another "good deal". I had no idea of her effort at the time. This is only one example of the way she quietly goes about serving people through her church with clothing, food drives and prepared meals.

Her consistency at the gym extends to the way she is always available to offer patrons—at no cost—her expertise in home realty and insurance, having long-standing licenses in both practices. Recently she has also donated her time to act in two anti-racist plays just to "broaden her horizon" of talent. I am humbly proud to be one of Pamela's good friends.
