Spiritually Speaking: To Save FUUCE, To Save the Earth, To Save Ourselves

What can you do to help save FUUCE? What can you do to save the Earth or make it a better place to live?

So let's begin with the beginning. I was invited into a conversation about merging congregations, partnership, redemptive and socially relevant work. And what has ensued?

We've talked a lot! We have sought outside help, and talked some more, and guess what? Now, it's time to act. Now is the time to figure out deep within your hearts and minds whether you have what it takes to pull the plug on this historic congregation or whether you have what it takes to be part of a new creation. I have lots of thoughts but – ultimately - this is about the members that still care to act, show up for the upcoming congregational vote, and voice their opinions for the future of this spiritual home. Earth Day is almost here, Spring is purportedly here. Easter and all of its connotations is here. Let's look outside for a minute and consider these thoughts:

In commentary published some time ago in Seedmagazine.com, co-editor Lee Billings suggested that Earth Day might be more effective if stripped of its

"save the planet" sensibilities. He offered that a better message would be "save the humans."

This concept made me think, "Now maybe here is a way to finally get things done." But upon further reflection, I realized this more anthropocentric view is also the problem that set the whole abuse of the earth and ultimately ourselves in motion.



I get that we humans far too often can't possibly get involved in the issues of the day unless it affects us personally. For example, my friend's daughter is marrying a non-white female and all of a sudden Black Lives Matter and GLBT issues are on his mind, dialog, and agenda. Or another associate of mine is now all abuzz with housing

for the low income people that are being forced out of building and neighborhoods. By the way his building is going coop and he doesn't want to pay the price they are asking.

Let me get back to my point. We human beings very often can't see the forest for the trees! This is widely known. But what I'm suggesting today is that it actually takes for most people a real sense that the cause they are getting involved in is their cause, too. The appeal to our species' self-preserving, even self-serving, instincts has arguably gotten

even stronger over the years, as behavioral psychologists and behavioral economists have put forth their insights to help make greener choices more appealing to our status-seeking, myopic brains.

In Heal the Earth, Heal the Soul: A Time For Change, John and Mark Sandford introduce ancient Biblical perspectives for properly relating to nature. The land itself is injured when we sin, and is healed along with mankind when we turn from our wicked ways. The authors dismantle the corporate mental strongholds of Aristotelianism and Docetism which have facilitated the injury of our planet and the destruction of local ecosystems. Surpassing the humanistic "green" perspective, we learn that mankind's repentance, in proper relationship with plants and animals, can indeed lead to healing the earth.

Or in another text I read recently, Senator Gaylord Nelson, father of Earth Day, said, "No writer has more persistently argued for the need of a national ethic of environmental stewardship than Michael Frome." That was forty years ago. In this collection, Frome reviews his own work, merging preservation of the wilderness with social justice, human dignity and the American spirit. Above all, he renews his faith and hope, and spreads the message like a gospel.

So, my friends, as Earth Day approaches us yet again, and the spring and summer are almost upon us, I'm calling on our community of caring, involved activist UU's and friends to do more than you have ever done before.

The time is now. Your physical health, mental health and spiritual health may well depend upon your getting involved.

We weathered the storm of "fracking" in New York State, and this is relevant because the Delaware River and other water sources that come into NJ come from New York, at least for the time being, but forces are moving and conspiring against the people. States around us are trying desperately to encourage industry to move in, create

THE CELEBRATION SPACE

This has been a year of change and challenges as we transform ourselves and look for a new direction for our small, but active and committed, liberal religious community here in Orange. Last year, in the wake of talks of merger with our faith neighbors, the UU Congregation at Montclair, the church brought on Rev. Gordon Clay Bailey to guide us into our next phase. However, when the nature of that relationship changed to "partnership – two churches, one community", the Board of Trustees committed itself to move forward toward an urban ministry that would be a show piece for UUs in New Jersey, and the Metro New York district. We have undergone several workshops and visioning sessions, among ourselves, with our partners in Montclair, and increasingly with groups in our community, to help us better plan and successfully launch an urban ministry in Essex County.

But the process is far from over. Whether we move forward depends on what YOU, the members of the First UU Church of Essex County, decide is our collective future, and what form it will take. Will it be an independent urban ministry non-profit organization housed within our walls and using our space to further its goals based on UU principles? Will the church continue at a much reduced level of activity, being more of a motivating agent for the urban ministry? Will the church continue at all, with its proceeds being handed over to a new non-profit, or to a special fund for scholarships, or to the UUA with the stipulation of establishing a new congregation in a promising area nearby? These are basically the options available to us at the moment, and whether there will be a worship program at the church next year and in years to come.

However, we on Celebrations have made plans for as

far as we can see. At the Board's direction, Gordon's time allotment has been changed so he can focus more of his time on developing the urban ministry. This necessitated that his time in the pulpit be reduced from twice a month to once a month effective immediately. His future dates for the rest of this year are: 12 April, 10 May and 7 June, the last being our annual Flower Communion. We have held our last Sunday of this year (14 June) in reserve for our Annual Meeting. (Please mark it down.) Beloved Community Sundays will continue at a roughly monthly schedule, but there will be only one more East-West Sunday, on 3 May, after which it will cease.

Looking ahead - and if the church continues for another program year - we will reduce worship to 10 services in total - roughly one per month. The time of services will change from 11 AM to either the late afternoon or early evening on Sundays under a format we have labeled "Soulful Sundays", based on "Soulful Sundown" that have been tried at other UU churches. Services will be followed by a communal dinner. Beloved Community may continue, but not likely on Sunday mornings. Other such programs, such as Adult RE and/or a book club may augment activities at the church, depending on interest. (INTERESTED? LET US KNOW! Contact the church at office@essexuu.org.)

As things progress, we will keep you updated on the worship calendar for the rest of the coming year and what's ahead.

His most recent work Democracy at Work: A Cure for Capitalism inspired the creation of the non-profit organization Democracy at Work. Wolff is also the author of Occupy the Economy: Challenging Capitalism and Capitalism Hits the Fan: The Global Economic Meltdown and What to Do About It.

He hosts the weekly radio program “Economic Update,” on public radio stations nationwide including WBAI. He writes regularly for The Guardian and Truthout.org and appears frequently on television and radio. Recent guest spots include “Moyers & Company,” “Up with Chris Hayes,” and “Democracy Now!”

15 Now NJ is a part of a nationwide grassroots movement aiming to raise the minimum wage through the mobilization of working people. Founded in June of 2014, 15 Now NJ has built living wage action committees throughout the state, organized marches, drafted legislation, and changed the conversation about poverty in New Jersey.
